A significant individual is a person who has done something to change the world.

#### Reasons for a person being significant *She or he:*

- changed events at the time they lived
  - improved lots of people's lives – or made them worse
  - changed people's ideas
  - had a long-lasting impact on their country or the world
- was a really good or a very bad example to other people of how to live or behave

Amy Johnson is Britain's most famous female pilot.



Nellie Spindler trained to be a nurse. In 1915 she went to be a nurse in a military hospital.

In April 1917 Nellie moved to a hospital near the battlefield so she could help soldiers with very serious wounds to get

treatment quickly.



Florence Nightingale was born in 1820 and died in 1910.

She was a nurse who was sent to a military hospital in Scutari during the Crimean War.

Florence set about improving both the environment and the care that the soldiers' received.

When she returned to England, Florence continued to campaign for better standards in hospital care and set up the first training schools for nurses.
